- 3) Distribution of gifts to bring smiles to the young beneficiaries.


The event was announced via a notice dated 6th November 2019, inviting NSS volunteers and students to participate and contribute to this noble cause.

1. Introduction

2. Activity Details

As part of its community service initiatives, the NSS Cell of Netaji Subhas University, Jamshedpur, organized a "Road Safety Awareness Programme" on 22nd December 2019 at Jubilee Park, Sakchi, Jamshedpur. 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

1. Introduction

The activities undertaken during the visit included:


- 1) Interaction sessions between volunteers and elderly residents.

- 3) Small recreational activities to bring joy to the senior citizens.


The event was announced via a notice dated 17th December 2019, with registrations closing on 20th December 2019.

3. Outcome

The visit to Ashirwad Old Age Home on 23rd December 2019 yielded profound emotional and social outcomes, deeply impacting the elderly residents, the 15 NSS volunteers, and the university's community engagement efforts. The interaction sessions, as noted on Page 19, allowed volunteers to connect personally with the senior citizens, many of whom experience isolation. This exchange fostered mutual understanding, with the elderly sharing life experiences that enriched the volunteers' perspectives on resilience and aging. The

distribution of essential commodities—ranging from daily necessities to small comforts—addressed immediate needs, enhancing the residents' quality of life and demonstrating tangible support. Recreational activities, though simple, brought laughter and positivity, breaking the monotony of the residents' routines and reinforcing the NSS goal of promoting social harmony. For the volunteers, including named participants like Ayushi and Hasan, the experience cultivated empathy, patience, and a heightened sense of social responsibility, aligning with the NSS aim of personality development through service. Their active involvement—from planning to execution; also sharpened organizational skills and group dynamics. Within the university, the event elevated NSS's visibility, encouraging other students to participate in future initiatives and strengthening the institution's reputation as a socially conscious entity. Report on NSS Activities During Lockdown Organized in 2020

1. Introduction

With due consideration of the jeopardised status of the country during the COVID era, adapting to challenging circumstances is vital for youth engagement in community service. During the COVID-19 pandemic, the National Service Scheme (NSS) at Netaji Subhas University, Jamshedpur, continued its efforts through virtual platforms. The "Activities During Lockdown" initiative, including weekly meetings and webinars, aimed to maintain volunteer momentum, raise awareness, and support the community amidst unprecedented times.

2. Activity Details

As part of its response to the pandemic, the NSS Cell of Netaji Subhas University, Jamshedpur, organized "Activities During Lockdown" throughout 2020 in the state of Jharkhand, district East Singhbhum. The programme was led by Prof. Raju Bhagat, NSS Programme Coordinator, and Prof. Sai Bharti, Programme Officer, with participation from all NSS volunteers.

The activities undertaken included:

- 1) Weekly virtual meetings to discuss volunteer efforts and appreciate their dedication during the pandemic.
- 2) A webinar on "Child Abuse" and the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act (POCSO), educating students on legal measures.
- 3) A webinar by UNICEF Jharkhand and Central University of Jharkhand on "COVID-19: Prevention, Awareness, and Role of the Student Community," outlining NSS responsibilities.

These activities were conducted online, ensuring continuity of NSS efforts despite lockdown restrictions.

3. Outcome

The "Activities During Lockdown" in 2020 showcased the NSS Cell's adaptability and resilience, delivering significant outcomes despite the constraints of the COVID-19 pandemic. The weekly virtual meetings, as detailed on Page 21, provided a consistent

platform for all volunteers to stay connected, share updates on their individual contributions—such as spreading awareness in their localities; and receive recognition from Prof. Raju Bhagat and Prof. Sai Bharti. This regular engagement sustained morale and creativity, reinforcing the NSS ethos of collective effort even in isolation. The webinar on child abuse was an eye-opening experience, equipping volunteers with knowledge about the POCSO Act and empowering them to identify and address such issues in their communities, aligning with NSS's social service objectives (Page 3). The UNICEF and Central University of Jharkhand webinar (Page 23) further enriched their understanding of COVID-19 prevention strategies—like mask-wearing and hygiene—and clarified their roles as NSS volunteers in educating others, directly contributing to public health efforts in East Singhbhum. These virtual initiatives enhanced volunteers' digital communication skills, critical thinking, and adaptability—key aspects of personality development; while fostering a sense of duty during a national crisis. For the broader community, the awareness generated through volunteer outreach likely amplified pandemic preparedness, demonstrating NSS's enduring impact. This period of activity solidified the unit's reputation as a proactive force, inspiring sustdined virtual and future in-person engagements.
