

S.S.G Gujarati School, Bistupur Report on Project Literacy Organized on 2nd April 2022



1. Introduction

The National Service Scheme (NSS), launched in 1969 by the Government of India, seeks to develop students' character through community service, guided by its motto. At Netaji Subhas University (NSU), Jamshedpur, the NSS unit, established in 2019 with 100 volunteers, drives social upliftment, notably in its adopted village, Mukhiya Danga. On 2nd April 2022, NSU's NSS Cell partnered with the Rotaract Club of Social Crew to organize Project Literacy at S.S.G Gujarati School, Bistupur. Targeting students in classes 6, 7, and 8, this initiative aimed to impart foundational computer skills, empowering young learners for a digital future and aligning with NSS's mission of educational outreach and youth development.

2. Activity Details

Project Literacy took place on 2nd April 2022 at S.S.G Gujarati School from 9:00 AM to 1:00 PM, coordinated by Mr. Raju Bhagat, NSS Coordinator. Around 20 NSS volunteers engaged approximately 50 students in a structured learning experience.

Activities Undertaken:

- i). Computer Basics Workshop: Lessons covered computer startup, MS Office tools, and internet basics.
- ii). Interactive Q&A Session: Students asked questions about software and online safety.
- iii) Hands-On Practice: Volunteers guided students in creating documents and browsing educational sites.



The event began with Priya Kumari's talk on digital literacy's importance, followed by Ashutosh Kumar and Taniya Sahu leading lessons. Nisha Mourya supervised practice, ensuring hands-on learning. It concluded with student feedback.

3. Outcome

Project Literacy delivered far-reaching outcomes, significantly impacting students, volunteers, and the broader school community. For the 50 students, the workshop was a pivotal step toward digital inclusion. Many, previously unfamiliar with computers, mastered basic operations; creating Word documents and navigating the internet. One student expressed excitement about using these skills for school projects, while another saw it as a gateway to online learning resources, enhancing academic prospects. This tangible skill acquisition bridged a critical technological gap for rural youth, fostering confidence and curiosity about digital tools.

Volunteers experienced profound personal growth. The event's ripple effects were notable in the school ecosystem. Teachers reported a surge in student enthusiasm for technology, with several advocating for regular computer classes—a direct outcome of the workshop's success. The collaboration with Rotaract extended its reach, as 10 additional students requested future sessions, reflecting sustained demand collectively, the volunteers gained a deeper sense of purpose, with their enhanced skills and empathy aligning perfectly with NSS's ethos of service-driven development. Project Literacy not only empowered students but also transformed volunteers into proactive, socially conscious leaders, ensuring a lasting legacy of educational upliftment.

Report on Health Checkup Camp Organized on 20th July 2022



1. Introduction

The Health Checkup Camp on 20th July 2022, with Rotaract Club, offered free eye and general health checkups to villagers, students, and staff, aiming to enhance well-being, promote awareness, and provide volunteer service experience, aligning with NSS's public health goals.

2. Activity Details

Held on 20th July 2022 at Mukhiya Danga from 10:00 AM onward, the camp was coordinated by Mr. Raju Bhagat with medical specialists, involving 25 NSS volunteers and serving 93 beneficiaries.

- iii) Health Awareness Talks: Sessions covered hygiene and nutrition.

Nisha Mourya and Khushboo Kumari managed screenings, Diksha Pandey handled logistics, and Rita Kumari led talks, ending with follow-up commitments.

3. Outcome

The Health Checkup Camp delivered transformative results, significantly impacting Mukhiya Danga's health landscape and volunteer growth. Serving 93 beneficiaries, including 10



cataract patients referred for surgery, it addressed critical needs, enhancing quality of life. The community saw lasting gains. Villagers adopted better practices, with 20 requesting regular checkups, reflecting heightened awareness. Cataract interventions prevented potential blindness, earning NSU gratitude and trust. The Rotaract partnership strengthened NSU's ties, with 15 villagers joining future events. This camp not only improved health outcomes but also moulded volunteers into compassionate leaders, fulfilling NSS's service vision with a legacy of empowerment and community connection.

Report on Project Menstrual Hygiene and Sanitation Organized on 24th September 2022



1. Introduction

The NSS, established in 1969, promotes student growth through service, guided by "Not Me But You." At NSU, Jamshedpur, the NSS unit, since 2019, targets hygiene in Mukhiya Danga. Project Menstrual Hygiene and Sanitation on 24th September 2022 aimed to educate villagers, break taboos, and promote health, empowering women and enhancing volunteer awareness, reflecting NSS's gender equity and health focus.

2. Activity Details

Conducted on 24th September 2022 at Mukhiya Danga from 10:30 AM to 2:00 PM, the event was led by Mr. Raju Bhagat, involving 30 NSS volunteers and reaching over 50 villagers.

Activities Undertaken:

- i) Expert Talks: Gynecologists addressed menstrual health and myths.

- iii) Sanitary Product Distribution: Pads were distributed.

Mondira Kumbhakar introduced experts, Roja Dabn facilitated Q&A, and Sonali Kumari and Richa Kumari handled distribution, ending with a hygiene pledge.

3. Outcome

Project Menstrual Hygiene and Sanitation profoundly impacted Mukhiya Danga, empowering over 50 women and transforming volunteers. Pad distribution reduced health risks, with many adopting sanitary products—a first for some.



Beyond the tangible distribution of products, the project fostered a noticeable cultural shift. Menstrual health, often considered a taboo topic, was brought into open discussion, challenging long-standing stigmas. The impact of this openness was evident, as fifteen women requested monthly sessions, demonstrating a growing interest in sustained education and support. This response indicated a deeper willingness within the community to prioritize menstrual health, signalling a long-term behavioural change.

The volunteers who participated in the project experienced significant personal growth. Engaging with the community on such a sensitive issue enhanced their communication skills and deepened their empathy. Overall, the project successfully broke barriers, empowered women, and equipped volunteers with invaluable skills and compassion. It aligned perfectly with the mission of the National Service Scheme (NSS), which aims to nurture socially responsible youth committed to community welfare. The lasting impact of the project was evident not only in the immediate adoption of sanitary products but also in the growing demand for ongoing menstrual hygiene education. This initiative created a ripple effect of awareness and empowerment, laying the foundation for a healthier, more informed






